# ELOKA Partner Meeting in Fairbanks, Alaska

In August 2023, ELOKA partners gathered at the University of Alaska, Fairbanks (UAF), and spent four days learning from one another and shaping future goals and priorities for ELOKA. Partners traveled from different regions in Alaska, British Columbia and Labrador, Canada, and Finland. During the four-day meeting, partners shared perspectives and experiences related to Arctic research, cultural place name documentation, observations, and data management. Many different types of projects and research priorities were represented, bringing unique perspectives and knowledge to group discussions.

Throughout the meeting, attendees reflected on ELOKA as a service provider and a network, and shared what ELOKA has been doing successfully, how ELOKA can improve, and priorities for the future. Some important priorities that emerged were equity in research, Indigenous data sovereignty, involving youth, and the urgency of responding to environmental crises. UAF filmmaker and professor Maya Salganek filmed a large part of the meeting, which will be developed into a short film about the ELOKA network. Overall, the meeting successfully brought partners together to learn from each other and build a sense of community.

## Chevak Students film and interview Elders

ELOKA is excited to share a project led by the Chevak Traditional Council, in collaboration with the Yukon River Inter-Tribal Watershed Council (YRITWC) and See Stories in Chevak, Alaska. See Stories, an organization that teaches youth film-making techniques, were invited to teach sixth grade students how to direct, produce, and film interviews with their Elders.

By creating videos that focus on meaningful places, the sixth graders dug deep to tell important stories about their lives, Chevak, and their community. By the end of an intense week of production and editing, 15 two-to-three minute videos were presented to an audience of school and community members, who erupted in cheers like a rock concert whenever images of Chevak appeared.

The videos eventually reached an even larger audience. Six short videos were chosen to enter the Alaska International Film Festival in Anchorage. Two made it for the December 2022 screening. In March 2023, all the videos were presented at the Alaska Tribal Conference on Environmental Management (ATCEM) in Anchorage. Eventually, the videos will find a permanent home on the Nunaput Atlas, a place name atlas that documents traditional and cultural place names in Chevak.
